The Leopard Skin, Wayne Swaylik MM3 1961-1963

"On our second Med Cruise, 1963, we were on patrol in the Red Sea. We were privileged to enjoy the Suez Canal again and ports like Djibouti which is north of Somalia, where we took on water that you could not drink and the popular drink was a 'pop' called Zam-Zam. We finally caught a break and were told we were going to spend Christmas in Greece. But, it was not to be. We sat on the southern end of the Suez Canal and we sat, and sat, and sat some more. Then the big day, we sailed north and met one of our sister ships to transfer papers. But, that's not all to be transferred. We transferred 55 tons of dry milk onto the Haynsworth because our sister ship has her screws tangled up on a merchant ships anchor chain and being sent to Greece. The milk was to be taken south across the equator and delivered to Mombasa Africa for flood relief.

We all became 'Shellbacks and got used to sleeping on the 01 deck because of the heat. The heat in the aft engine room hit 140 degrees. The trip was worth it because when we pulled in, the sun was shining and the City was pure white in the sun because of the Marble Buildings. Liberty in Africa! How cool was that!

Now here comes the good part. It was late afternoon and the last liberty boat was coming back to the ship. I was talking to the Quarter Deck Watch when the OD arrived. Then the laughter started because, standing on the bow of the liberty boat was one of the First Division sailors. He was dressed in a Leopard Skin holding a (shield) and spear. I think he traded his uniform with a native outside the city limits for this garb. The Spear was taken from him and held 'til he got home. He hung the shield in First Division and stowed the Leopard Skin in a foot locker. From what I was told, you could not believe what First Division smelled like, in that heat, after one week. One of his shipmated broke open the locker and threw the (Leopard) skin overboard on our way back to Aden.

Interesting enough, this mild mannered seaman did not get busted for trading his uniform but did get in trouble for destroying First Division looking for his Leopard Skin. (Another interesting day on the Happy H). (Editor's note: Are there other 1963 Med Cruise shipmates/officers, that can add their memories of this amusing story?) Thanks Wayne. I added this story for shipmates that do not have access to internet and access to the USS Haynsworth Web Site.

<u>Subject: Dept. of Defence Extends online Military Exchange Shopping Privilages to honorably discharged</u> <u>Veterans.</u> (I received this notice from my DOD subscription on Jan. 13).

Department of Defence News Release dtd. Jan. 13, 2017 (page 8)

The DOD announced a policy change that will extend <u>limited</u> on-line Military Exchange, AFES), shopping to all <u>honorably discharged</u> veterans of the Military. The Veterans on-line shopping benefit will be effective this coming Veterans Day, November 11. 2017.

While shopping privileges exclude the purchase of uniforms, alcohol, and tobacco products, it includes the Exchange Services dynamic on-line retail environment known so well to active service members and their families. The policy change follows careful analysis, coordination and strong public support.

"We are excited to provide these benefits to honorably discharged veterans to recognize their service and welcome them home to their military family," said Peter Levine, performing the duties of the Under Secretary of Defense for personnel and readiness.

"In addition, this initiative represents a low risk, low cost opportunity to help fund 'Morale, Welfare and Recreation' programs for support of service members and their families quality of life. And, it's just the right thing to do," Levine added.

The on-line benefit will also strengthen the 'Exchange's on-line businesses to better serve current patrons. Inclusion of honorably discharged veterans would conservatively double the exchanges on-line presence, thereby improving the experience for all patrons through improved vendor terms, competitive merchandise assortments and improved efficiencies, according to DOD officials.

"As a nation, we are grateful for the contributions of our service members. Offering this lifetime on-line benefit is one small tangible way the Nation can say, 'Thank You'.

Antietam, Valley Forge---- memorials of great battles won and tribulations overcome.----- I liked the lean angular names of Navy - "tin-cans and escorts--Barney, Dahlgren, Mullinix, McCloy, Damato, Leftwich, Mills (Haynsworth)--mementos of heros who went before us. And the others -- San Jose, San Diego, St. Paul, Chicago--named for our cities.----- I liked the tempo of a Navy band blaring through the topside speakers as we pulled away from the oilers (and carriers), after refueling at sea.----- I liked liberty call- and the spicy scent of every foreign port. (Editor's note: I remember Naples back in '58 as not being 'spicy'! I think those aboard at that time would use a different word.)-----I liked the 'all hands' working parties as my ship filled herself with the multitude of supplies so as to carry out her mission anywhere on the globe where there was water to float her.----I liked sailors, officers, and enlisted men- from all parts of the land, farms of the Midwest, small towns of New England, from the cities, the mountains and the prairies, from all walks of life. I trusted and depended on them as they trusted and depended on me- for professional competence, for comradeship, for strength and courage. In a word, they were "shipmates": then and forever.----I liked the surge of adventure - in my heart, when the word was passed: "Now hear this, set the special sea and anchor detail - all hands to quarters for leaving port."-----I liked the infectious thrill - of sighting home again, with the waving hands of welcome from family and friends waiting pier side,------ I liked the hard and dangerous work. The going was rough at times; and the parting from loved ones painful, but the companionship of robust Navy laughter, the "all for one and one for all" philosophy of the sea was ever present.----I liked the serenity of the sea - after a day of hard ship's work, as flying fish flitted across the wave tops and the sunset gave way to night.-----I liked the feel of the Navy in darkness - the masthead and range lights, the red and green navigation lights and stern light. The pulsating phosphorescence of radar repeaters - they cut through the dusk and joined with the mirror of stars overhead. (Editors note: I still remember my first night aboard and had my first[mid] watch on the fantail, back in '58. I was in awe of the ships wake and the part of the fleet that was behind the Havnsworth as we sailed for the Med.)-----And I liked drifting off to sleep - lulled by the myriad noises, large and small, that told me that my ship was alive and well, and that my shipmates on watch would keep me safe. -----I liked quiet mid watches - with the aroma of strong coffee--the life blood of the Navy, permeating everywhere. And I liked the hectic watches when the exacting minuet of haze-gray shapes racing at flank speed, kept all hands on a razor edge of alertness.-----I liked the sudden electricity of 'General Quarters', all hands man your battle stations", followed by the hurried clamor of running feet on ladders and the resounding thump of watertight doors as the ship transformed herself, in a few brief seconds, from a peaceful workplace to a weapon of war--ready for anything. And I liked the sight of space-age equipment- manned by youngsters clad in dungarees and sound powered phones that their grandfathers would still recognize.-----I liked the traditions of the Navy heroes - Halsey, Nimitz, Perry, Farragut, John Paul Jones, Howard W. Gilmore, Burke, and (Havnsworth). In years to come, when sailors are home from the sea they will still remember, with fondness and respect, the ocean in all its moods-the impossible shimmering mirror of calm waters or the storm tossed green water surging over the bow. And then there will come again, the sound and laughter from the mess deck, a faint whiff of a stack gas, a echo of engine noises, a vision of 'Old Glory' snapping in the breeze. As they have gone ashore for good they will grow wistful about their Navy days, when the seas belonged to them and a new port of call was ever over the horizon. "I was a sailor once and proud of it." Remembering all of this, they will stand taller and say,

Extracts from the USS HAYNSWORTH DD-700's Official Web-Page

(Editor's lead-in.)

Since the debut of the new official USS Haynsworth web-page on <u>http://usshaynsworth.org</u>, I thought it would be a service to all of our shipmates and their families that do not have internet access to our web-page, to share in the stories of some officers and enlisted that have shared some of their more memorable memories of life aboard the (Happy) Haynsworth. But first, I wish to thank SOG2 Anthony (Billy) Barnett 1958-1961, for all his efforts, and incredible work, in developing <u>and</u> continuously maintaining the web-page current. Since the call went out for stories while serving aboard Haynsworth, several members of the officers and crew responded with some <u>very interesting</u> stories. I would like at this time to extend the request to <u>all</u> of you to share with the officers and shipmates your memories. Thank You! The first extract from the web-page goes to our webmaster, Billy Barnett. The title of Billy's story is; ------

"NEVER VOLUNTEER".

"As a general rule, volunteering is considered to be something you just don't do!, How experiencing it, was a great thing. In the summer of 1960 we went into dry dock in Portsmouth, Virginia.

We were going to be there approximately 3 months. A day or two after entering the Dry Dock, I was sitting at a table in the mess hall along with 3 others when an officer addressed us and said "Need a rated sailor with a valid driver's license". Without even thinking, I immediately raised my arm and said, "I'm your man".---As it turned out, it was the best thing I could have done at the time. As many of you know, life aboard ship in dry-dock can be a very dirty, noisy and unorganized life.

I was sent to 'Temporary Assigned Duty' (TAD) in the motor pool for the duration of the time we were to be in dry-dock.-----I had three jobs: 1) Drive a bus and pick up sailors on the pier, whose ship's mess halls were under construction, and drive them to and from the Portsmouth mess hall. I did this three times a day. 2) Drive officers and other VIP's (by car) to various meetings in and around the Norfolk area. And, 3) Drive the bus with sailors to evening "BEER BALL GAMES". The return trip from the Beer Ball Games was generally a real mess. In all instances, there was always somebody that got sick. However, the rule of thumb was made extremely clear before we departed......if you get sick....."YOU".....clean up the mess.

The best part of the TAD was that I was only required to be on duty every third day; 24 hours on duty and 48 hours off duty worked great for me. I had made friends with many of the locals in the Norfolk area.While on duty in the motor pool, I bunked there. Otherwise, I bunked with my friends in Norfolk. I had my own car so it was easy for me to get around. <u>End of story. Thanks Billy.</u>

(Ed. Note: I was aboard at that time Billy but I never did go on one of those 'Beer Ball Games'.) The only clear memory I have of that dry-dock time is the job I was assigned to. I was assigned to the CPO's quarters up forward and my duties were to cook three meals a day for them and keep the Chief's Quarters clean. I enjoyed that assignment and the Chief's seemed to enjoy the meals I prepared. I learned to cook (and clean) from my Mother so I was O.K. at it.)

The next 'memory' is from LT(jg) David J. Oberholzer, 1957-1959. Bethlehem, Pennsylvania <u>"CAUGHT IN THE ACT"</u>

I had the duty one Sunday night while Haynsworth was moored at the Destroyer-Submarine piers in Norfolk. At about 1030 the duty Machinist Mate informed me that we had a leak in the stop valve in the main steam line near the after engine room.-----As we were scheduled to get underway at 0800 Monday, this required immediate repair. The valve in the 8 inch diameter steam line was sealed to the flanges of the steam line by the ¼ inch thick copper seals, one of which had the leak. We did not have the required copper on board to make a replacement seal, so I headed several piers over to the USS Sierra (AD-18)' (a destroyer tender repair ship) to get some. In talking with the OOD, a Warrant Carpenter, I explained our plight. As luck would have it, he was in charge of the sheet metal shop, and would oblige us. (cont'd on page 13)

The messenger of the watch escorted me down to the shop were the crewmen were asleep on mattresses on the steel deck(it was a hot night). We woke one of the men sleeping by the sheet metal shear and engaged him to slide out a 4 foot by 4 foot slab of ¹/₄ inch thick copper plate from the supply rack. By now. A few others had awaken and helped him load the copper onto the shearer and start the machine. When the piece I wanted, (1 foot by 2 feet), was sheared by the blade, it went crashing down on the steel deck plates- now everyone in the shop was awake!

As I made my way back to the quarterdeck, I thanked the OOD profusely and went down the gangway and over to my car. I opened the trunk and as I was putting the copper in, a man in a bathrobe with a leashed dog in tow approached me and said. "What are you doing son?" I explained myself to the gentleman who then introduced himself. He was Rear Admiral Claude V. Ricketts, COMDESFLOTFOUR (Commander Destroyer Flotilla Four). His flagship was Sierra and was walking his dog.

The Admiral wished me well! (WHEEW)!!!

P.S. We were ready to "answer all bells" at0800!

The next 'memory' is from Seaman Paul Verderame, 1955-1957 Melbourne, Florida.

We had a collision with a tanker when we were fueling in Cape Hatteras, North Carolina. We had to go into Mayport, Florida for repairs. The weather was 75 degrees in December! That's when I made up my mind where I was going to live when I got out. (Editors note: Thanks Paul. And, from your current address in Melbourne' Florida, I see that you did!)

Rec'd Jan. 15, 2017 f/ Marty Irons Author of 'Phalanx against a Devine Wind'. Fairhaven, Vermont. Subject: (Jack) McAllister at Camp Catlin

(Jack) Graduates from the radio course at Camp Catlin, Oahu, Territory of Hawaii, March 17, 1945. Camp Catlin was home to the Top Secret Combat Information Center training school. John McAllister, RM3/c, can be seen in the 2nd row, fifth from right. He boarded the USS Quincy (Baltimore Class Heavy Cruiser) CA-71 two weeks later to be returned to the Haynswotth.

He was unaware that a Kamikaze had struck the ship and killed four of the Radiomen aboard her.



I have had several requests for this picture of the Haynsworth with the ships name painted on her at mid-ship. This picture was reportedly taken on October 27, 1944 (Navy Day) at a port in Maui, Hawaian Islands. 




